WHAT IS CHILD ABUSE & NEGLECT?

Any act or failure to act on the part of a parent, caretaker, or adult which results in death, serious physical or emotional harm, sexual abuse or exploitation, or presents an imminent risk of serious harm.

Children do not have the ability to protect themselves. We must make sure every child, everywhere has the chance to grow up happy and strong. ISPCAN is committed to bringing forward better practice, prevention and policies to end this tragedy and loss of life.





THE MULTI- DISCIPLINARY APPROACH

Child abuse and neglect is a violation of child rights. Government programs for child protection, laws to enforce abuse as criminal behavior, multidisciplinary professionals trained with best practices, collaboration within child protection agencies (law, medical and mental health) to minimize re-victimizing the child, and funding to support treatment and services for families are critical parts of the public health solution to this problem. ISPCAN connects the dots and brings these networks together with data and solutions.

The impacts of child abuse and neglect are debilitating and cause lifelong health, emotional, and relationship issues. Adverse childhood experiences are all the negative exposures that are proven to impact a child's development, brain chemistry, and attachment. The consequences are both immediate and long lasting, and very difficult to treat. ISPCAN equips professionals with the specialized tools, information, and connection to other professionals in this underdeveloped field to help bring data, practices and a shared community of learning. Systems of care must adapt to recognize, prevent and treat child abuse. ISPCAN advocates for professionals to come together to create a child-centered treatment, prevention and criminal action plans. Mental health must be coordinated with physical health, and the child trauma must be minimized throughout all the stages of reporting, investigation, treatment, referrals, public health prevention, and legal action.

Research, policy development and awareness are all key to eradicating all forms of child abuse. Every nation, culture, religion and community needs tools and resources to remove the shame and start finding solutions.



2019 INCREDIBLE IMPACTS GRANT AND AWARD

AWARD WINNING

The International Society for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (ISPCAN) won the 2019 prestigious Incredible Impacts Grant and Award for best association legacy program. This cash award was sponsored by Best Cities Global Alliance and Meetings Escrow.

ISPCAN was awarded this honor in Houston, and the executive director gave a presentation on our Congress Legacy programs. ISPCAN congresses are more than an event, they change entire systems of care, public health awareness for child protection in a region, and empower the local practitioners. Both community and pre-congress events supplement the knowledge, tools and best practices in data collection, child death review, positive parenting and youth engagement in the communities where we host congresses. Additionally we can plan in person trainings for police, teachers and other professionals who are critical partners in the child abuse prevention strategies but who may not otherwise attend our scientific congresses. Our councilors and subject matter experts are able to do skills trainings, core courses.

Legacy programs are developed in concert with our local partners in a congress who also plan community wide events such as art contests in schools, youth action plans, and public health awareness campaigns to bring a larger impact to our congresses, creating waves of change throughout all levels of society

INSPIRE WORKSHOPS


The World Health Organization (WHO) initiated preparation of the INSPIRE package, in collaboration with the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), End Violence Against Children: The Global Partnership, the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), the President's Emergency Program for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), Together for Girls, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), United States Agency for International Development (USAID), and the World Bank (agencies with a long history of galvanizing a consistent, evidence-based approach to preventing violence against children). ISPCAN is a member of the INSPIRE global implementation working group.





IGNITE Philanthropy donor fund sparks progress toward building a robust Global Partnership to End Violence Against Children, fueled by powerful grassroots voices with a strong resource base. ISPCAN benefits from the philanthropy's unique role, flexibility, and ability to act quickly to empower partners and allies.







World Health Organization is a scientific sponsor of ISPCAN Congresses providing keynote speakers for our International Congresses. In 2019, ISPCAN partnered with WHO and the GPeV to add workshops on the INSPIRE Strategies for ending violence against children in Oman with the help of Unicef.

GLOBAL PRESENCE AND COLLABORATION

Child abuse and neglect is a worldwide problem which has gained recognition in recent years, and this is evident at our ISPCAN international congresses and conferences. We are help address the thirst for knowledge in how best to meet the needs of maltreated, children; some of the most vulnerable populations are even more susceptible to violence. Most at risk are refugee and migrant populations, disabled and children in out of home care, and where parents are not able to provide a safe and healthy home. As a result, children are trafficked, abused, forced into child marriage, bullied, and put in a myriad of unhealthy situations with life long consequences.

ISPCAN international Congresses convene leaders, clinicians, and researchers from across disciplines to share the latest scientific research in prevention, clinical practice, and advocacy around child rights issues. We create communities of learning, networking and shared practice to improve entire systems of care.

Over the last three years, over 4,000 delegates have attended our events in Kenya, Calgary, The Hague, Dubai, Prague, Oman and Qatar. Approximately 25% of conference delegates are from low/middle-income countries and some presenting authors have been financially subsidized to attend these valuable ISPCAN events.

n 2018, we started offering a Journal Club webinar series based in Australia, providing members an opportunity to listen to discussions about select research articles, presented by academics and practitioners. In 2019, we took this idea a step further by offering our own monthly series based on articles exclusively from Child Abuse and Neglect: The International Journal, presented by the authors themselves. As a service to child protection professionals worldwide, ISPCAN Journal Clubs are free and open to the public--and, as a result, we have seen attendance increase steadily. Overall, our Journal Clubs and webinars in 2019 were attended or viewed more than 1,800 times.



Child Abuse & Neglect: The International Journal, rated #1 on Google Scholar for Social Work, is a monthly peer-reviewed journal of multidisciplinary studies from all over the world on all aspects of child abuse and neglect.

Members receive a free subscription, including online access to current and archived issues going back to 1977, and the option to subscribe online only. Notably, the Journal has increased its value to readers by adding more articles and special issues, while maintaining high-quality content. The Journal is downloaded about a million times annually.

In 2019 we found more members requesting the online journal in an effort to reduce waste, be more environmentally conscious and have immediate access to monthly editions. The electronic table of contents is sent monthly to members and one article is chosen for journal club where the author is invited to present their work in a free webinar.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY


ISPCAN receives revenues from a variety of sources, including membership dues, grants, publications, international conferences, trainings, and in-kind donations. These revenues have provided the resources necessary to deliver direct services to our members, support for member-initiated projects covering specific topics or regions, and provide additional services and support to child maltreatment professionals who are not yet members.

These financial data do not capture the total value of our programs and services. Thanks to the significant contributions of our volunteers and Country Partners, we are able to offer our members more comprehensive support than we would otherwise.

ISPCAN audited financial results for 2019: Current assets at the end of 2019 were \$731,913, property and equipment at cost (less depreciation) was \$4,179. Total assets were \$738,498 and total liabilities were \$114,551, bringing ISPCAN's year-end net assets to \$623,947. This is a net decrease in net assets of \$36,454, and is primarily reflected in an decrease in cash.

to be protected from violence, exploitation and abuse. While some children are particularly vulnerable due to their gender, race or socio-economic status, higher levels of vulnerability are often associated with children with disabilities or those living in war zones, on the move or living in poverty. The focus on the prevention and response to violence, exploitation and abuse of the child cuts across all parts of social welfare, education, health and security sectors among government and civil society.

THIS YEAR 2019

the world commemorates the 30th anniversary of the adoption of the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC). Since 1989, when the CRC was first adopted, much has changed, especially for children – and in another 30 years, things will continue to change in unforeseeable ways. Global trends, like technological advancements, environmental change, protracted conflict and mass migration are changing childhood rapidly. Today's children face new threats to their rights, but also have new opportunities to realize their rights. The 30th anniversary of the CRC provides an opportunity to advocate for the CRC, the realization of children's rights and the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals and Agenda 2030. Both are inextricably linked and critical to ensure that all children grow up in a safe and supportive environment.
