Framing the Challenge

300 million children, aged 2–4 years, regularly suffer physical punishment and/or psychological violence at the hands of parents and caregivers

One in 5 women and one in 13 men report having been sexually abused as a child aged 0-17 years

120 million girls and young women, under 20 years of age, have suffered some form of forced sexual contact

Consequences include lifelong physical and mental health harm, and the social and occupational outcomes can ultimately slow a country's economic and social development

An abused child is more likely to abuse children as an adult, so violence is passed down from one generation to the next

Ongoing care of children and families can reduce the risk of maltreatment reoccurring and can minimize its consequences

Health, care and social protection systems do not have the capacity they need to support victims of abuse and neglect

Intolerable pressure of limited supply and increasing demand for public services

Call-to-Action

We need better national systems for preventing & responding to child abuse and neglect

Twofold failure for global society – cannot protect children from abuse and neglect or ensure victims have adequate care

Another generation of children will suffer the consequences of adverse childhood experiences across their whole lives

The lifetime impacts of violence against children can be prevented with the right care at the right time and...... It will take all of us



Estimated prevalence and cost of child sexual abuse


