We reflect with pride on a year defined by purpose, collaboration, and progress for children around the world. In a time of growing global challenges, ISPCAN remained focused on one central aim: helping countries and professionals strengthen prevention-oriented, integrated systems that respond effectively to the needs of children and families.

Through the new Rise Up Policy Forums and Huddle initiatives, ISPCAN supported governments and partners in translating research into coordinated action. These bold efforts strengthened linkages across health, education, justice, and social welfare sectors, moving countries beyond isolated projects toward more sustainable and scalable approaches to child protection. Our community of learning grew to include more policy makers, to add to our research and practice experts.

A second major area of progress was in advancing evidence and learning. ISPCAN continued to elevate high-quality research through the Journal of Child Protection and Practice and expanded opportunities for cross-country exchange. In 2025, we emphasized data that directly informed policy and practice, including cost-effective prevention strategies, workforce development models, and indicators of system performance. Knowledge sharing was increasingly connected to real-world decision-making at national and regional levels. This new journal has been accepted by Scopus and will be indexed within our three-year goal, while our flagship journal Child Abuse and Neglect continues to lead the field as the most impactful journal.

By deepening our global and regional partnerships and recognizing that child protection challenges vary by context but benefit from shared learning, ISPCAN strengthened its regional networks and promoted multidisciplinary collaboration. Building capacity through a skilled child protection workforce will always remain a core priority. In 2025, ISPCAN expanded professional development opportunities and promoted ethical, trauma-informed practice across disciplines, investing in a new working group on education and launching ISPCAN NEXT to support early career development. Leadership development and workforce capacity-building were central to our approach, recognizing that strong systems depend on skilled professionals who are supported and equipped to protect children effectively.

Advocacy for prevention is a moral and economic imperative. ISPCAN worked with governments and donors to frame child protection as a strategic public investment rather than solely a social service. In all programs, we highlighted the public health approach: evidence demonstrating that early intervention and family-centered supports reduce long-term health, social, and economic costs while contributing to more resilient communities. Sustainable change to systems is critical.

We close the year with gratitude for our members, partners, and supporters whose commitment made this progress possible. The achievements of 2025 demonstrated what can be accomplished through collaboration, evidence, and sustained leadership. We look ahead with confidence, knowing that the foundation laid this year will continue to advance the safety, dignity, and well-being of children worldwide.

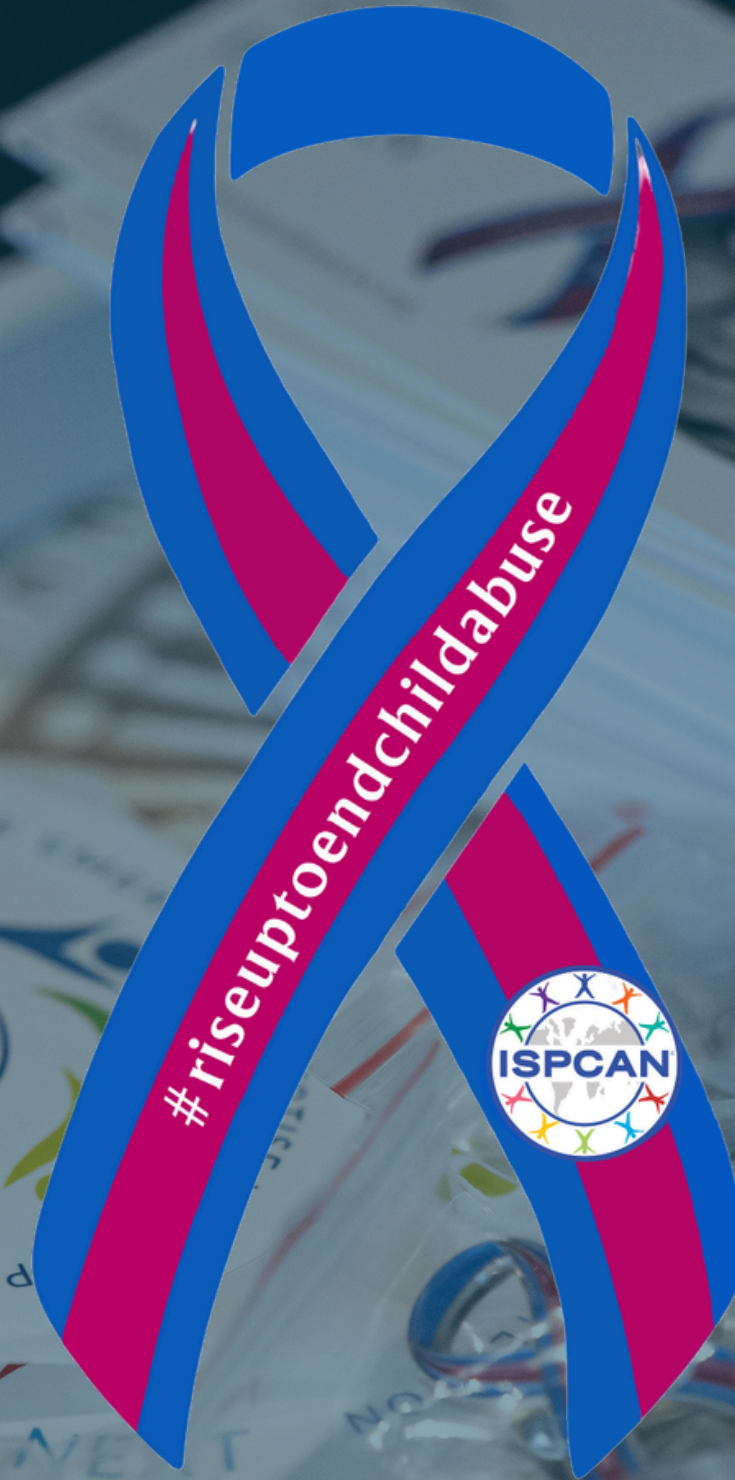

PREVENTION AS PUBLIC INVESTMENT



LEADING A PUBLIC HEALTH APPROACH TO CHILD PROTECTION: SIX FOUNDATIONAL PILLARS

ISPCAN aims to help countries improve the foundations of child protection by advancing the six pillars of a public health and system-strengthening approach to preventing child abuse and neglect. Together these pillars form the basis of a strong child protection system.

These ISPCAN public health pillars are developed in concert with our CSO Forum partners and aligned with the **Child Protection System Strengthening Framework for Action** launched at the 2024 Ministerial Conference on Ending Violence Against Children.

1. Ensure effective governance and multi-sectoral coordination.
2. Improve policies and legislation.
3. Advance data driven and evidence-based solutions to ending violence, abuse, and neglect of children.
4. Invest in national action plans, capacity building, and bringing solutions to scale.
5. Ensure child rights through universal access to a continuum of child protection prevention, early intervention, and response services.
6. Establish mechanisms for child, survivor, and community participation in solutions.

By embedding a public health approach within national strategies, budgets, and cross-sector systems, policymakers can reduce long-term social and economic costs while safeguarding the health, development, and rights of future generations. The choice is not whether action is possible, but whether it will be prioritized.

A NEW INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY OF PRACTICE FOR GOVERNMENTS AND POLICYMAKERS

DEBUT OF THE INAUGURAL RISE UP POLICY FORUM

The Rise Up Policy Forum is ISPCAN's global action platform that unites governments and leading child protection experts to drive real-world policy solutions that prevent and respond to violence against children through a public health approach.

Why it matters: By connecting research, practice, and policymakers, Rise Up helps countries move from pledges to implementation — strengthening systems, scaling evidence-based strategies, and advancing accountability through sustained international collaboration.

Goal: Accelerate progress in child protection and translate country pledges made at the 2024 Ministerial Conference on Ending Violence Against Children into action.

Program: Twenty-two interactive mastermind sessions highlighted foundational measures, breakthrough strategies, government best practice, and technical expertise.

Impact: The first Policy Forum in Vilnius was attended by 270 multi-sectoral experts including 63 government delegates, researchers, practitioners, NGOs, survivors and activists, funders, and policy makers from 60 countries.

NEW RISE UP POLICY BRIEFS PROVIDE PRACTICAL GUIDANCE FOR POLICYMAKERS

DEBUTED THE INAUGURAL RISE UP POLICY FORUM

In 2025, we also launched our new Rise Up Policy Brief series. The Rise Up Policy Forum profiles the most impactful child protection strategies. ISPCAN’s new series of policy briefs translate them into practical guidance for policymakers.

The first brief, Investment with Impact: Multisectoral Actions and Coordination in Barnahus, draws on lessons shared at the Rise Up session in Vilnius. It demonstrates how child-centred, multisectoral response hubs like Barnahus strengthen protection, recovery, and justice—while also delivering strong cost effectiveness.

HELPING ADDRESS THE BIGGEST CHILD PROTECTION CHALLENGES FACING THE WORLD

By taking a public stand on key issues, we strive to deliver real change through a broad coalition of dedicated multidisciplinary partners dedicated to the protection of children everywhere.

In 2025, we focused our efforts on the following key issues:

- Children's access to essential health services, including trauma-informed mental health care, forensic medical evaluations, and treatment of adverse physical sequelae of violence and exploitation
- Advancing research on child maltreatment prevention which requires sustained investment and international collaboration
- Global response services for children on the move who are impacted by global wars and deportation

SUPPORTING CHILDREN IN ARMED CONFLICT

Children should not be affected in the middle of armed conflict or used as pawns. The short-term harm and long-term morbidity and risks for child abuse escalate exponentially in these situations, as do their chances of becoming orphans.

Partners joined us and signed our petition to end the violence in civilian areas in war and supporting caregivers through this trauma.

Ultimately caregivers must have the tools and resources to help children to mitigate further harm. On change.org, we had 531 support this campaign.

IMPACT OF INTERNATIONAL POLICY AND DEFUNDING ON CHILD PROTECTION

UNICEF reports that foreign aid cuts across 17 high priority countries affect essential services to more than 2.4 million children.

ISPCAN remains resolute in its mission to work for the protection of children worldwide, regardless of geopolitical circumstances. Child protection must maintain or increase funding without bias for child protection research and practice, as the impact to child well-being is significantly worse during times of global violence and discord. Our duty is to serve all children without bias or discrimination based on race/ethnicity, nationality, gender, sexual orientation, religion or ability. We advocate to provide culturally responsive, trauma-informed, and rights-based care to children and families.

DEBUT OF THE INAUGURAL RISE UP POLICY FORUM

A RIBBON THAT REPRESENTS THE MOST VULNERABLE

Every November, ISPCAN conducts a global child protection campaign. It's centered on our organization's mission – "Rise Up to End Child Abuse." Together, along with our members and partners, we are raising awareness about the realities of child abuse and neglect so we can impact norms and behaviors across communities.

WHY IT MATTERS:

Technology, wars, social media — all of these create new threats, and we are struggling to keep children safe. Child protection today requires confronting the stigma of child abuse directly so we can act faster — because 1 in 5 girls and 1 in 7 boys experience sexual violence. We need universal preventative care for every child.

Our ribbon represents every boy and every girl; a reminder of the children whose safety and futures we are fighting to protect.

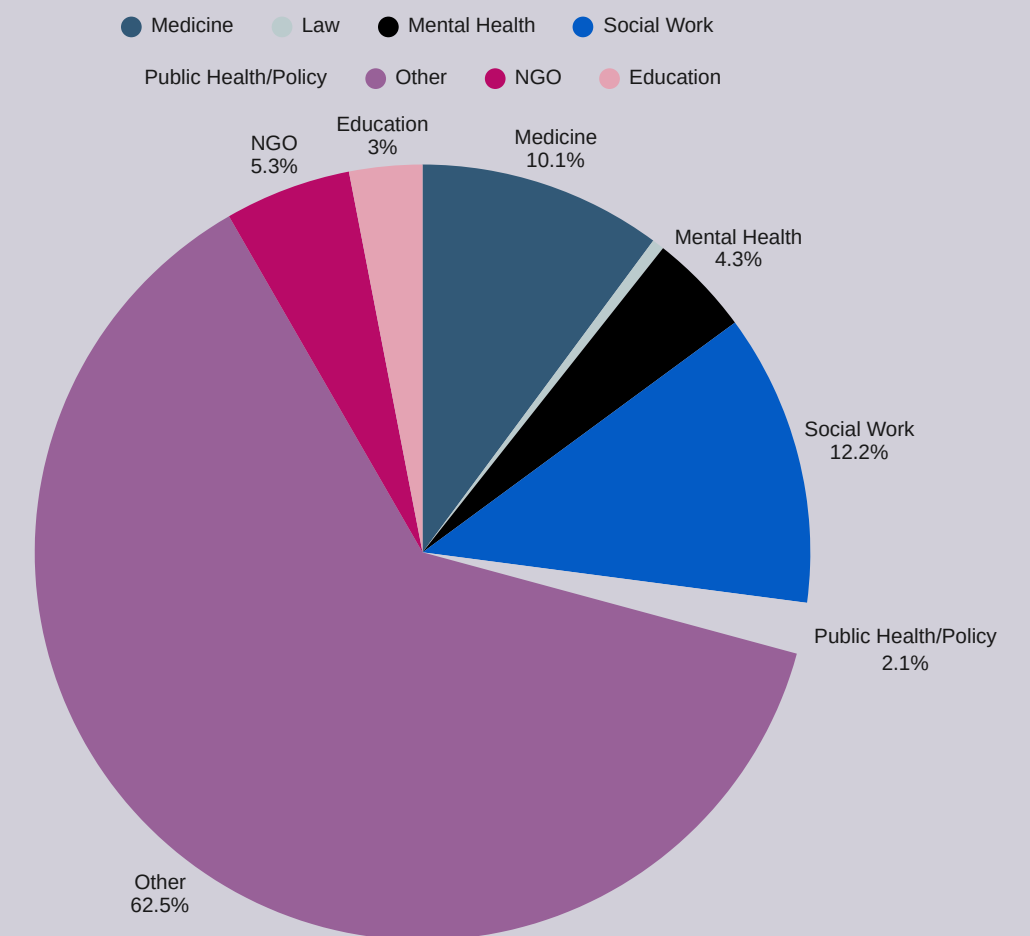
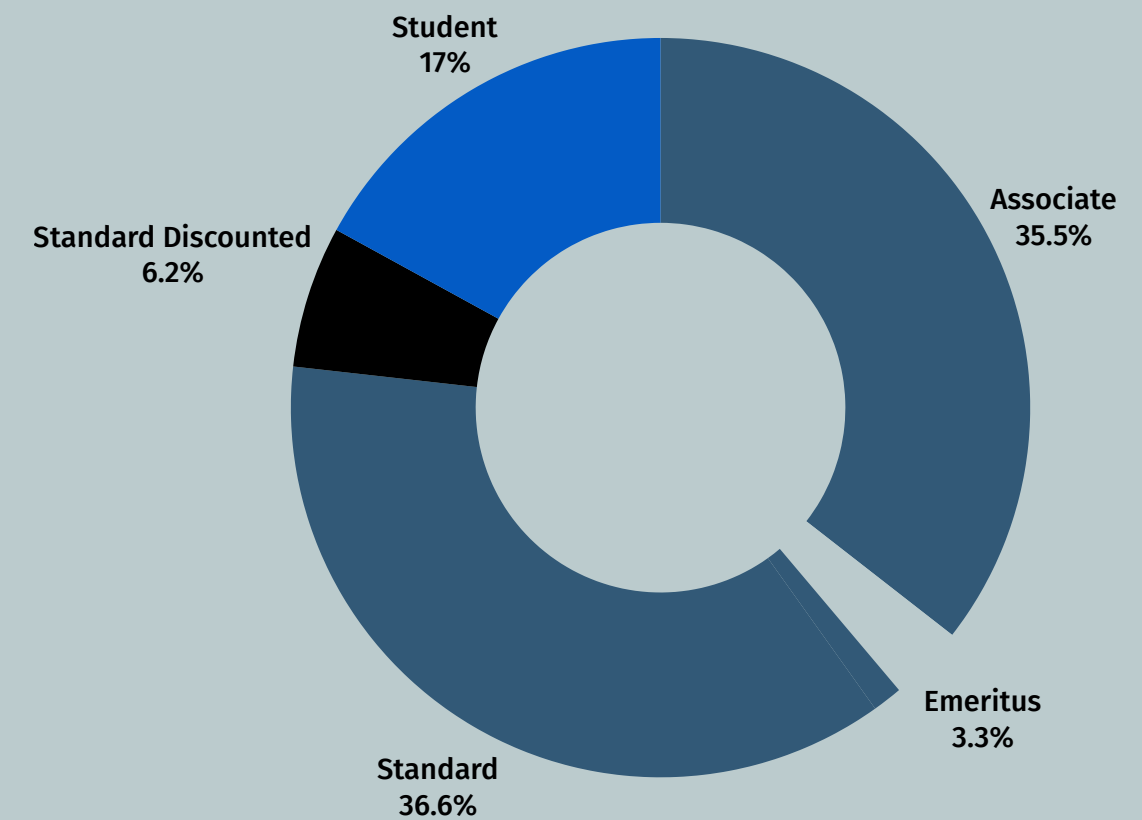

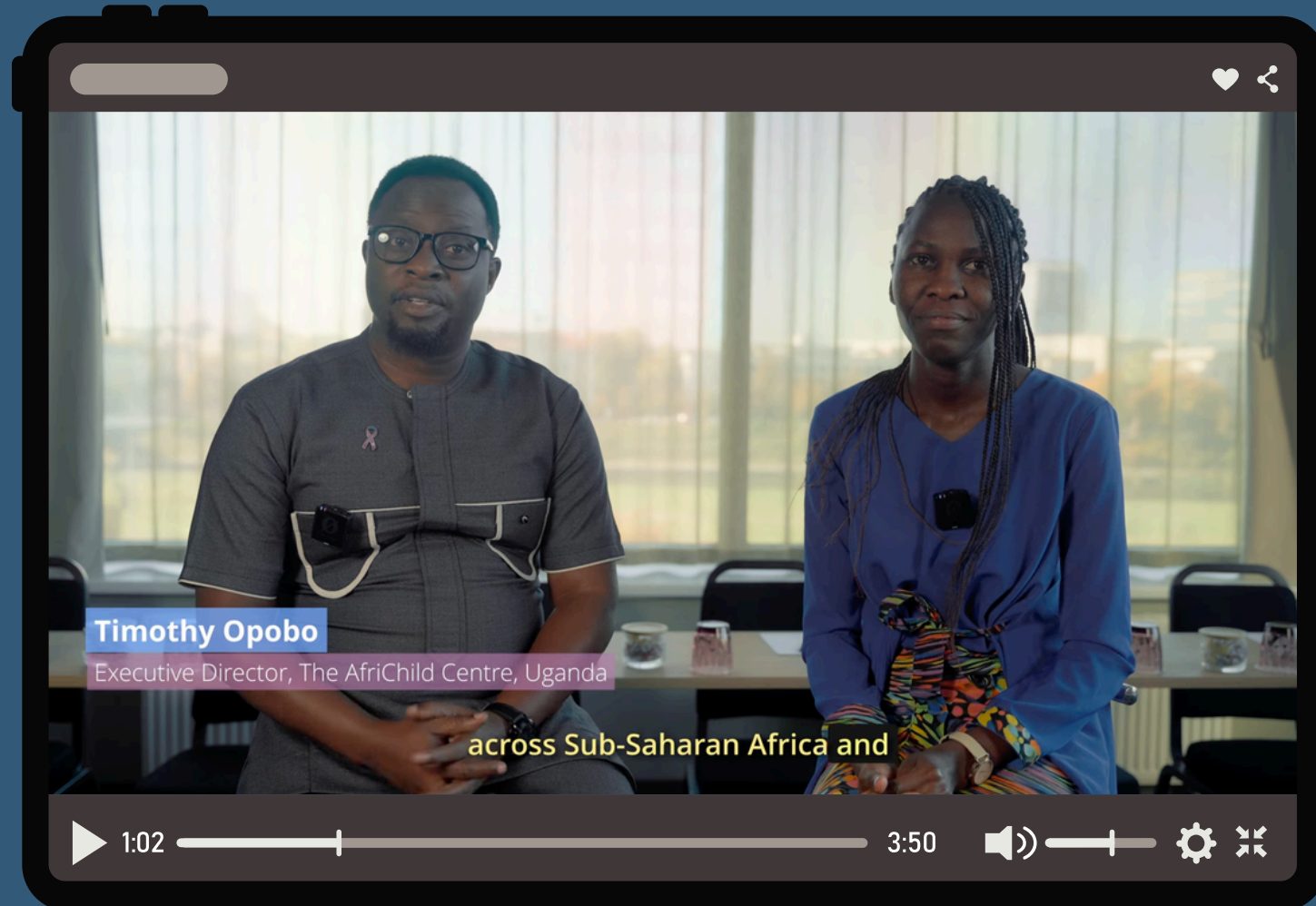

INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS GATHERING IN VILNIUS

Hosted in partnership with the Ombudsperson for Child's Rights in Lithuania, the 2025 ISPCAN Congress brought together multi-disciplinary experts to learn, share, and network with child protection experts from across the world. We hosted over 900 delegates from over 80 countries representing approximately 40 disciplines.

The Congress theme was "Child Well-Being in a Changing Reality" which emphasized the difficult realities, new challenges that children face, and the innovative solutions our global community is employing in research and practice.

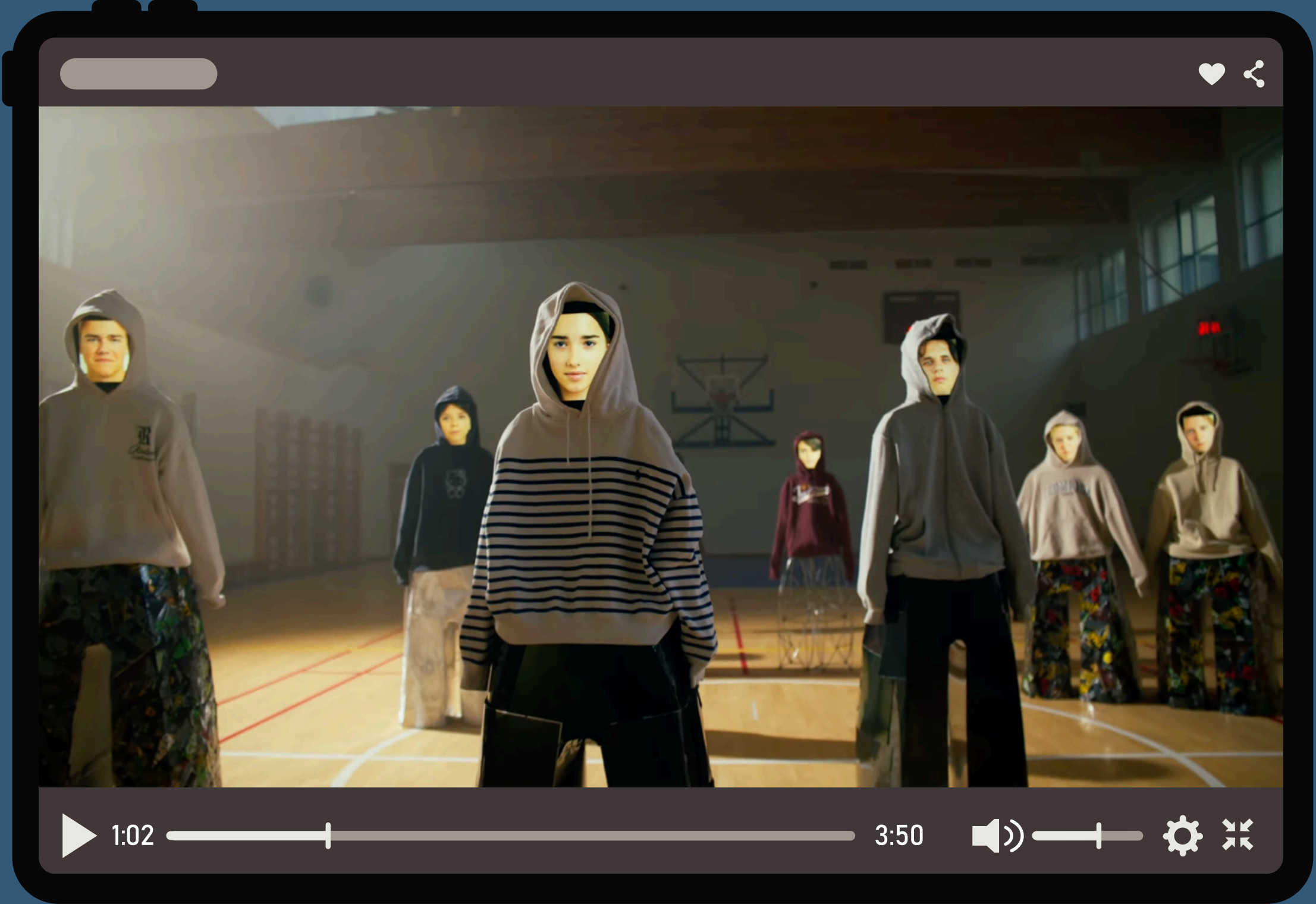

YOUTH FORUM PRESENTATION: YOUNG HEARTS, GREAT STRENGTH

In Lithuania, 1,165 children shared their deepest wish – to feel less anger, less anxiety, less sadness, and less of the heavy thought that they are “not enough.” They try to cope through music, tears, silence, or by hiding what they truly feel.

COLLABORATIVE LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

THE HUDDLE: A CASE-BASED LEARNING EXPERIENCE

The 2025 Huddle explored a multigenerational child sexual abuse case shaped by culture, family dynamics, and systems of care. Through a child-centered, case-based format, participants examined how medical, mental health, child protection, and justice systems responded to protect and support healing — and where missed opportunities may have changed the child’s trajectory.

Told through Sasha’s own perspective, including home videos that helped recreate his experience, the case invited participants to see the system through the eyes of the child. Participants also heard Sasha reflect on the case with the benefit of hindsight, offering powerful insight into what worked, what was missed, and what true child-centered practice requires.

By revisiting foundational cases in this way, The Huddle creates a valuable opportunity to assess outcomes, strengthen accountability, and identify best practices for professionals across child protection systems. Rooted in lived experience, it helps move learning beyond theory and toward continuous improvement in how systems prevent, identify, and respond to abuse.

The 2025 Huddle training included five online sessions, each focused on a different aspect of CSA and designed to deepen multidisciplinary learning and practice.

NURTURING THE NEXT GENERATION OF CHILD PROTECTION PROFESSIONALS

Equipping the next generation of global child protection leaders with the knowledge, connections, and tools needed to create a safer, more supportive world for children—now and in the future. ISPCAN’s new young professionals group, ISPCAN N.E.X.T (Network of Emerging eXpertise in child proTection), met in person for the first time at Congress. The event brought together 38 professionals from multiple regions.

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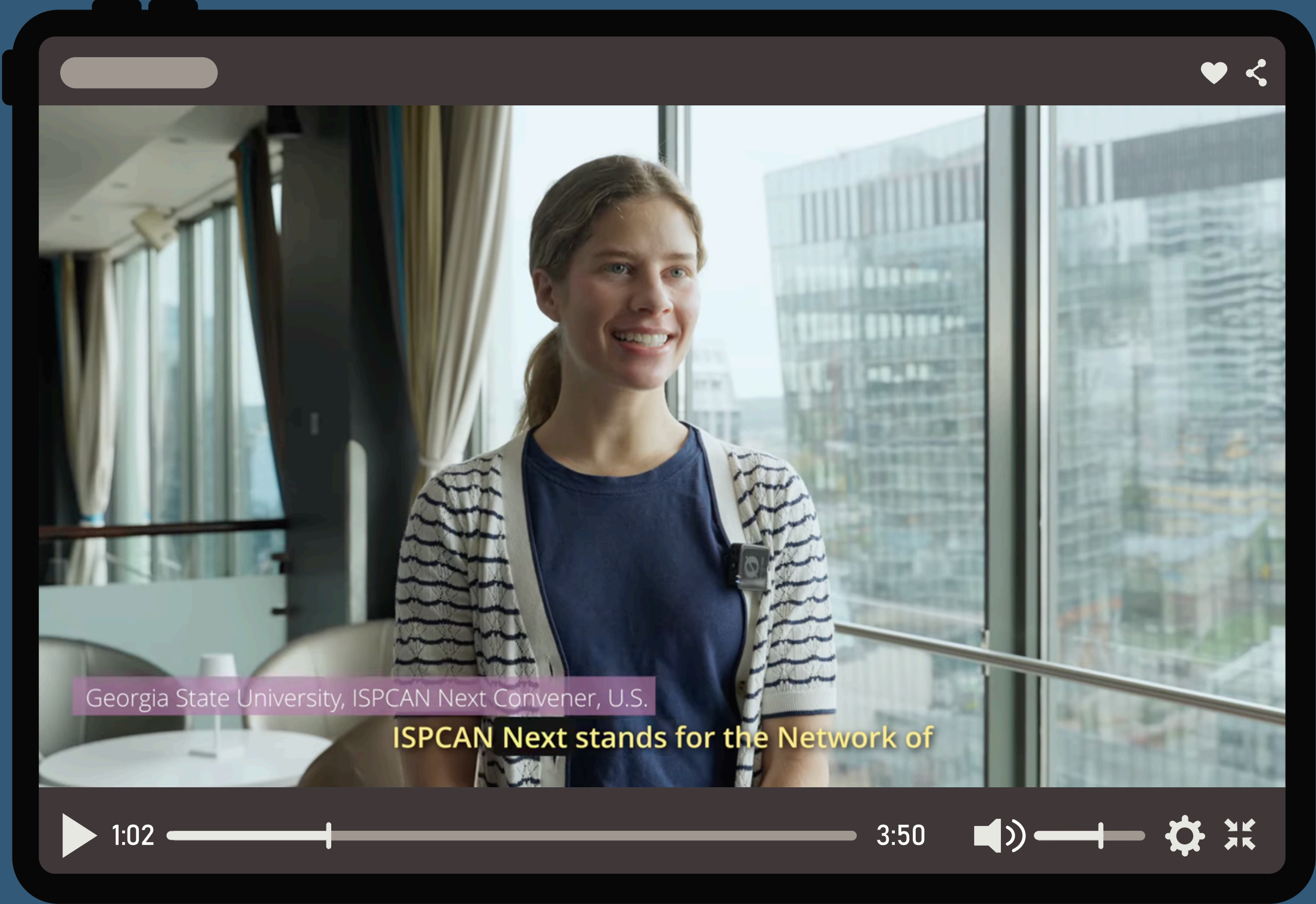




ISPCAN NEXT CONVENERS

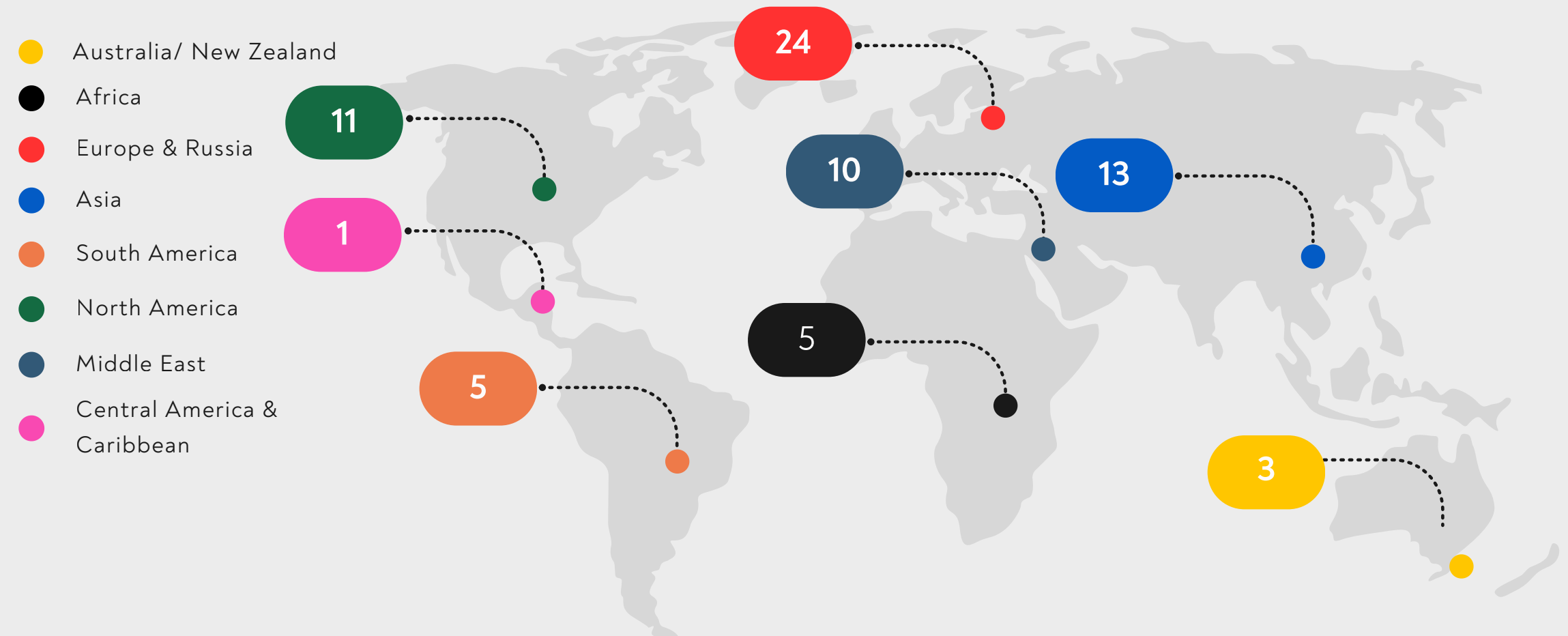
COUNTRY PARTNER BENEFITS:

INTERNATIONAL PARTNER SPOTLIGHT

Andrew Russo, Co-Founder of International Association of Family Support Networks, presented at the ISPCAN Vilnius Rise Up Policy Forum on Family Resource Centers (FRC). Developed in partnership with the local community and typically run by non-governmental organizations, FRC provides parenting support, access to resources, and builds families' social connections with each other.

Independent research has shown FRCs make a significant difference in supporting families to thrive, including yielding a \$4.93 social return on investment for every U.S. dollar invested and a 63% reduction in child maltreatment cases. There are national Networks of FRCs in Australia, Canada, France, Finland, Hong Kong, Ireland, Japan, Singapore, Sweden, and the United States, representing thousands of programs serving millions of families every year.

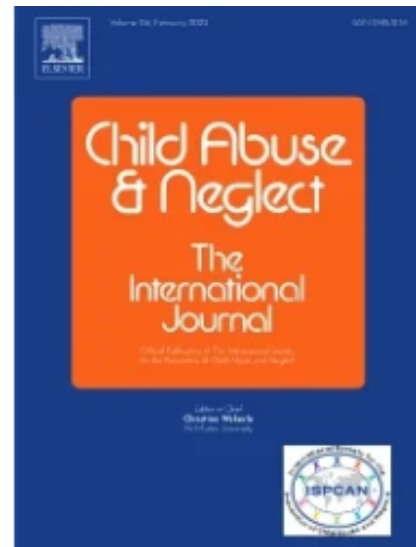

ISPCAN JOURNALS CURATE GLOBAL KNOWLEDGE



Our peer-reviewed monthly journal Child Abuse & Neglect: The International Journal is a member benefit and provides an international, multidisciplinary forum on all aspects of child abuse and neglect, with special emphasis on prevention and treatment. The Citescore of 6.1 and Impact Factor of 3.4 make it noteworthy in the field and the leading journal in child maltreatment.

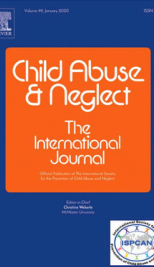

Background: Research on positive childhood experiences (PCEs) as counterparts to childhood adversity has surged in the last five years. A systematic review of the additive and interactive effects of childhood adversity and PCEs across adult outcomes is needed to contextualizes the long-term correlates of childhood experiences within a developmental perspective.

Objective: The current review synthesizes the empirical evidence for PCEs as resilience factors for a range of adult outcomes.

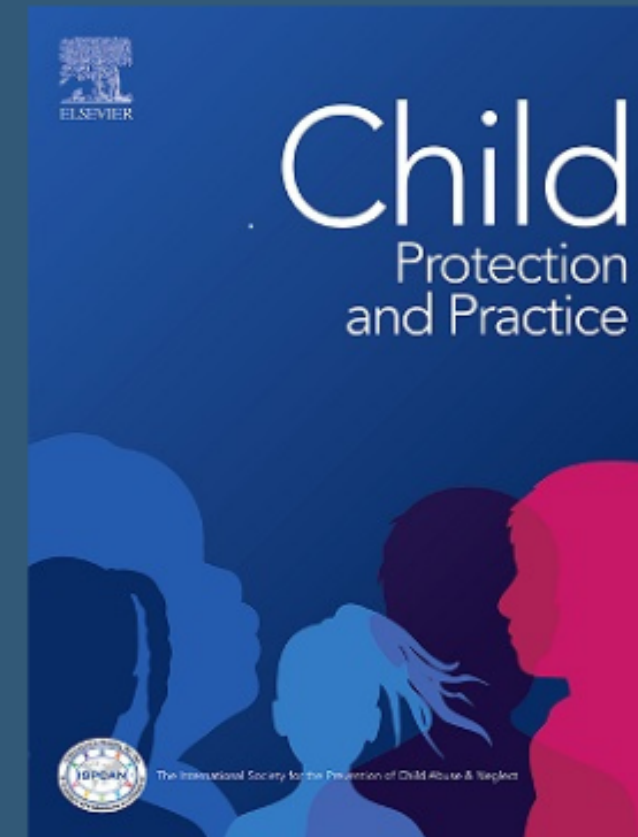

DEVELOPING TOOLS TO ADVANCE MULTIDISCIPLINARY COORDINATION

The 12-step framework for building an action plan for any community to respond and prevent Child Sexual Abuse launched in 2024, and is now being piloted in Palestine, published and shared in the Huddle.

Managing child sexual abuse cases well with good outcomes for children can be done anywhere with your existing resources. Developed over two years with a panel of experts and core partners, this 12-step, how-to framework is intended to help support teams and caregivers, regardless of their circumstances or training, to begin forming their own collaborative plan of action to Child Sexual Abuse. Everyone can build on the resources that they already have in their community to help children who have experienced sexual abuse with as little as two people. The Resource Guide and a customizable fillable form are included and can be used to help create a response plan that supports the strengths of any community and assist them to give children who have experienced sexual abuse the best support.

Each steps helps guide the thought process to decide what to build into a community's collaborative plan using the existing resources available. The plan will automatically generate and be applicable to their culture, their setting, and their community resources.

ISPCAN'S FREE ICAST DATA TOOL

**MEASURING THE SCOPE OF VIOLENCE
AGAINST CHILDREN**

ISPCAN's goal with ICAST is to provide a method to make reported incidence of all forms of violence against children more accurate and more representative of the true scope of the problem. Research instruments that measure child maltreatment are significant tools in preventing child abuse and neglect globally.

It is our hope that the use of these tools will result in policies and programs that promote child protection and in curricula adaptation for general and continuing professional education. Most child abuse research to date has been conducted in affluent, Western countries.

With the support of the Oak Foundation, ISPCAN collaborated with UNICEF, the UN Secretary General's Study on Violence against Children, the Office of the High Commissioner of Human Rights, and the World Health Organization (WHO) to create the ICAST. The tools were designed by international experts, reviewed by more than 100 professionals from different countries using a Delphi process, field tested in 8 countries, and refined. Since then, ICAST has been translated and tested in at least 20 languages.

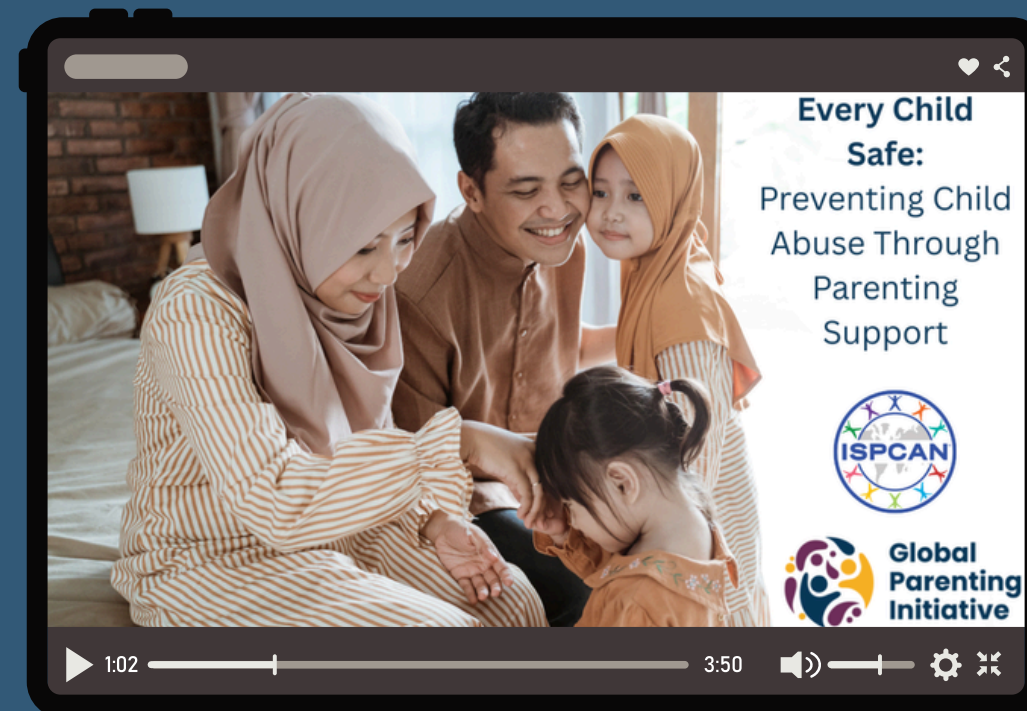



Context on Child Protection in Nepal:

- 1.1 million children in child labour; 200,000 in the worst forms (Nepal Child Labour Survey 2021).
- Around 5,000 children living/working/connecting on the streets, facing abuse, violence, and exploitation.
- More than 11,000 children are in institutional care in Nepal, Over 50% children have at least one living parent. (NCRC Report 2024).
- 85% of street-connected children face sexual abuse and exploitation (VOC Report).
- Kinship Care: legal gaps despite being a long-standing cultural practice in Nepal.



Ladder Approach for Reintegration of Separated Children into Families



Aim of the Program:
To protect street and family separated children from the risks of street life, sexual abuse, and prepare them for successful reintegration into parents, kinship, and foster care by ensuring their well-being.

CONCLUSION:

- Among the total reintegrated children, 81% are with their parents, 14% with kinship family, and 5% in the community (VOC Report).
- 150,000 children and 25,000 families have received in-person awareness on child rights and protection, including Kinship Care by VOC.
- Innovation of the Ladder Approach by Voice of Children and adopted by the Nepal Government in 2015.
- 2349 street-connected children have been rescued by Nepal's Government since 2016.
- 90% success rate has been achieved in the reintegration of children with their parents and kinship caregivers.

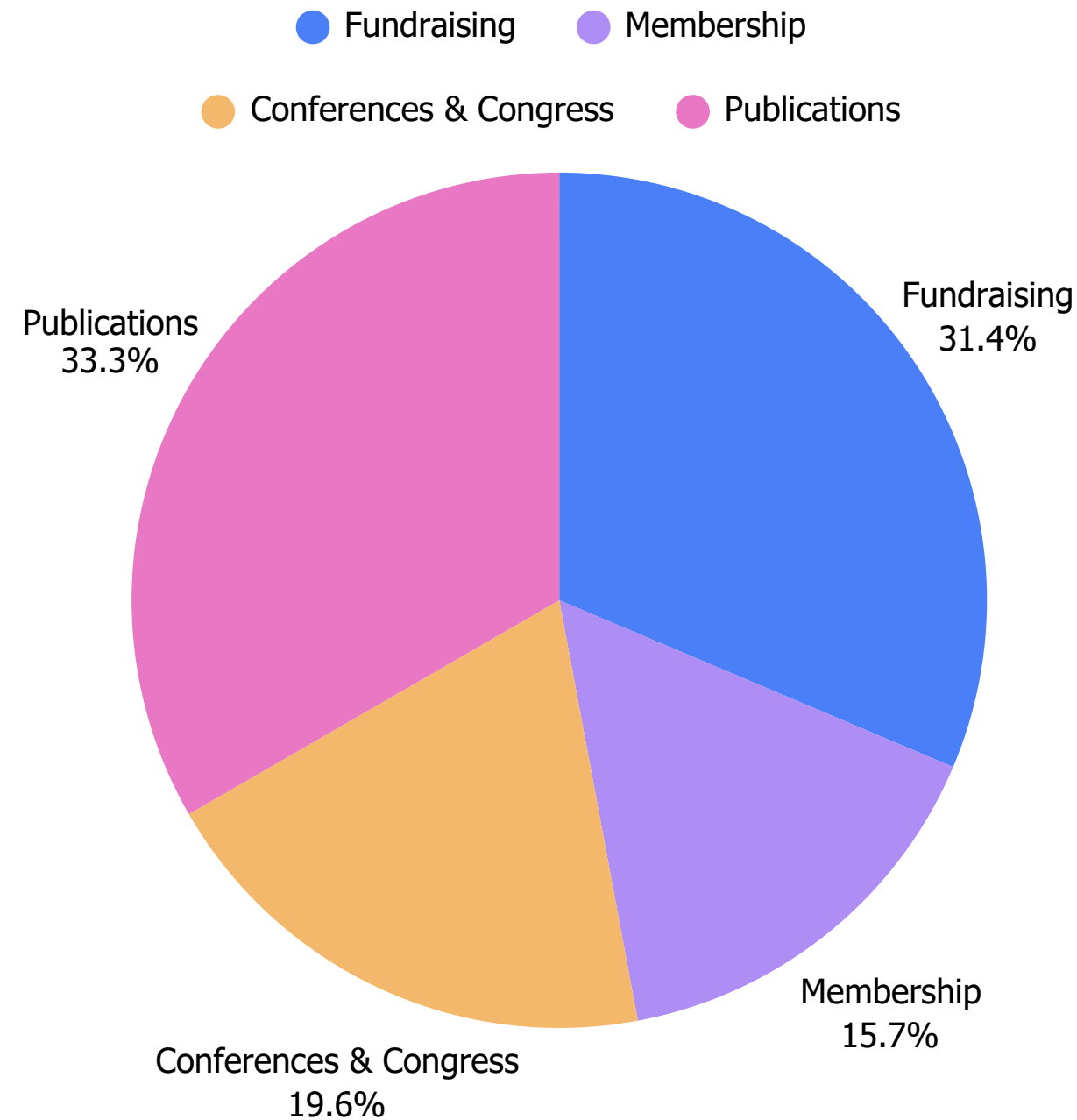

Diversified & Strategic Income Sources. Key factors contributing to growth:

2025 FINANCIAL STRENGTHS

1. Lean & Efficient Operations

ISPCAN continues to operate with a highly disciplined financial model, delivering global impact while maintaining low overhead and strong cost control. In 2025, total expenses below budget, demonstrating operational efficiency without compromising program delivery. In five years, ISPCAN has strengthened our assets by 50%.

2. Strong Financial Stewardship

With only 2% liabilities relative to total assets, ISPCAN maintains an exceptionally strong balance sheet. The organization closed 2025 with \$1.25M in assets and \$1.23M in net assets, ensuring long-term sustainability and resilience.

3. High Impact per Dollar

ISPCAN generated a surplus (31% margin), enabling reinvestment into:

- Global programs (Huddle, Rise Up)
- Country partnerships
- Research and policy advancement
- This reflects a model where each dollar raised delivers amplified impact

4. Strategic Revenue Growth

Revenue grew 72% year-over-year, driven by:

- Major expansion in fundraising (+\$603K YoY)
- Strong membership growth (+75%)
- This diversified revenue base strengthens long-term sustainability.

5. Scalable Model for Global Expansion

ISPCAN's financial structure demonstrates:

- Low fixed costs
- High adaptability
- Scalable program delivery

ISPCAN utilizes 100% of donations to provide support to the front-line workers tirelessly dedicating their careers to eradicating all forms of child abuse and neglect worldwide. Our entire board of directors supported ISPCAN to provide duty, care and loyalty to the organization.
